
What Is a Fronted Adverbial? Sticky Note Challenge

You can use sticky notes to help you to create different types of fronted adverbial.

In this activity, choose a main clause card and then write your own fronted adverbial on a sticky note.

Experiment by putting different fronted adverbials before the same main clause – how does the meaning of the sentence change? What punctuation do you need after your fronted adverbial?

For an extra challenge, use the ISPACE dice to decide what type of fronted adverbial you must write.
